

Abusive Patterns of Family Violence

- Previous research has a narrow focus on the victim (women or child) and their relationship with the offender. Few professionals consider factors such as the family context and the behavioural actions/ reactions of the other potential victims in the family.
- Aggression in the family is a product of context and the person/ environment interaction.
- Interventions to solve domestic violence and child abuse are best found in an holistic examination of the people involved in the family, their social and health problems and needs, and who is responsible for the ongoing brutality.







UK Elder Abuse Facts

- 500,000 abused at any one time in the UK
- 46% of abusers are related to the person they are abusing
- 66% of abuse is committed at home

- 6. Support and empowerment of older people



POWER AND CONTROL WHEEL

Physical and sexual assaults, or threats to commit them, are the most apparent forms of domestic violence and are usually the actions that allow others to become aware of the problem. However, regular use of other abusive behaviors by the batterer, when reinforced by one or more acts of physical violence, make up a larger system of abuse. Although physical assaults may occur only once or occasionally, they instill threat of future violent attacks and allow the abuser to take control of the woman's life and circumstances.

The Power & Control diagram is a particularly helpful tool in understanding the overall pattern of abusive and violent behaviors, which are used by a batterer to establish and maintain control over his partner. Very often, one or more violent incidents are accompanied by an array of these other types of abuse. They are less easily identified, yet firmly establish a pattern of intimidation and control in the relationship.



Aggravated Stalking

- 37% intimate or former intimate
- 59% other known person
- 7% Stranger

Multiple responses allowed

Significant minority of stalking happened following women's attempts to exit relationships

Costs and Consequences of Stalking

- Significant fear and safety concerns
- Depression, Anxiety
- Time off work
- Physical violence

Extent of domestic violence, sexual assault and stalking

- Inter-personal violence is both widely dispersed and it is concentrated:
 - some experience of domestic abuse, sexual victimisation or stalking for 36% of people
 - a minority, largely women, suffer multiple attacks, severe injuries, experience more than one form of IPV and serious disruption
- Overall, 45% of women and 26% of men aged 16-59 could recall being subject to domestic abuse, sexual victimisation or stalking at least once in their lifetime




STALKING Richard Jones and Subhajit Basu

- Unwanted communications
- Initial boundary violations
- Pseudo legitimate motivations
- Clear and persistent boundary violations
- Multiple methods of intruding, tracking, or surveillance
- Intrusions that are blatantly predatory or malicious
- Threats and violence (past or present)
- Disregard for legal sanctions and controls
- Daily life revolves around stalking behaviours

Stalking definition


- "Stalking is the repeated uninvited monitoring

- victim that is usually, but not always, undertaken
- for the purpose of frightening or intimidating the
- victim or those around the victim...

Perpetrators of Elder/Adult Abuse





Experience since age 16

- 21% women and 10% men experienced ns domestic violence (threat or force)
- 17% women and 2% men had been sexually victimised in some way
- 5% women had suffered a serious sexual assault, 4% had been raped
- Overall, 0.5% of men had suffered a ssa, with 0.4% reporting rape
- 19% women and 12% men experienced stalking or harassment at some point
