



**János Bertók** is Head of the Public Sector Integrity Division in the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) in Paris. He has been leading OECD activities for promoting integrity and preventing corruption in the public sector over 1.5 decade. The OECD helps policy makers and practitioners build sound integrity framework by reviewing and reforming governance measures in particular in areas vulnerable to corruption such as conflict of interest, revolving door, lobbying, political financing, public procurement, etc.

The OECD is in the forefront of providing comparative data, map out good practices and develop policy guidelines, principles, as well as practical tools for policy makers and managers. The groundbreaking work of the OECD includes four international instruments: the 2010 OECD Recommendation on Principles for Transparency and Integrity in Lobbying, the 2008 OECD Recommendation on Enhancing Integrity in Public Procurement; the 2003 OECD Recommendation on Guidelines for Managing Conflict of Interest in the Public Service; and 1998 OECD Recommendation on Improving Ethical Conduct in the Public Service.

Before joining the OECD in 1997, Mr. Bertók was a senior civil servant in the Prime Minister's Office in Hungary in charge of the modernization of public administration. His previous career focused on creating new legal and institutional frameworks for the civil service in the transition period.
